
Mathematical Decision Making for Life - Mr Larry King

Prerequisite: None



American Naturalism – Conspiracies in History – Mr Derek Varn

0.5 Credit - 0.25 US History, 0.25 English 11 Grades: 11th grade only Prerequisite: None



Students will learn about historical conspiracy theories and the truth or falsehood behind them. Students will use historical research methods to learn about alternative and conspiratorial views of American

history, what the actual historical research shows, and how we can use critical thinking and historical analysis to understand US. We will produce documentaries about a conspiracy from our own research, and then present the truth, as best we can establish it, from primary and secondary research.



Stitch in Time – A History of Knitting and Activism in the U.S. – Ms Khristian Owens

Grades: 11th grade only Limit: 20 students

From the Revolutionary War to the recent presidential election, Americans have used knitting as a way to be heard and take action for what they believe. Learn how to knit and where yarn comes from as we meet some fluffy friends (sheep, alpacas, and maybe even a bunny or two). Discover how yarn is made and dyed, using natural materials we collect such as onion skins, acorns, and beets. All the while, we'll be exploring how knitting has shaped our history and could continue to impact our future through your own act of knitting activism.
